ALTERNATIVE FORMS OF PRACTICE

If entrepreneurship within the art world and the arts educations could be seen as being able to suggest alternative forms of practice, how could we get inspired as teachers and researchers to provide various alternative forms of practice to our students?

From the *5th to the 9th of November 2018*, we invite you to Copenhagen and the Danish National School of Performing Arts to join us in the investigation of this question, and many more, concerning artistic entrepreneurship.

During different artistic labs and reflection rooms, we will set out on a common journey, trying to expand and unfold the field of artistic entrepreneurship together.

We will provide you with four very different workshops, mediated by four very different teachers from The Danish National School of Performing Arts. Each workshop is a laboratory in itself, offering different kinds of working methods, learning spaces, artistic and creative working tools and ways of being together as a community of practice.

After each workshop we gather in reflection rooms trying to outline and condense experiences, thoughts and doubts from the labs in order to connect them to the broad field of artistic entrepreneurship – and to our own teaching practice.

The purpose of the week is to look into the field of entrepreneurial mindsets and methods through practical work and common reflection. And thereby hopefully to expand our ideas and wishes towards solving entrepreneurial challenges in theatre higher education curricula.

PARTICIPANTS: TEACHER PROFILES

In order to create the best possible conditions in the lab work, it is crucial that the participating teachers are highly motivated and curious within the field, and that all participants are willing to investigate together. This must be emphasized when recruiting teachers for the seminar, and in the mindset of the research group, who will also be able to join the workshops. Therefore, please invite teachers from each partner institution, who are already interested in the field of artistic entrepreneurship and who are curious when it comes to join workshops and the programme as such.

There will be NO presentation or showing in the end of the lab work. We are not in this to show a product, but to investigate a theme together.

In this workshop Charlotte will invite you to work with different materials and textiles in a non-hierarchical space. By sampling and circulating materials, working on each other's materials and indulging what is happening, we will enter in new dialogues with our self, the material and the others. New working methods and cultural meetings will emerge in a tactile environment.

In this workshop, Inger Eilersen invites us into her teaching method “artistic response”, which she has evolved over the last five years. The teaching is a combination of artistic response and a systematic reflection, which aims to qualify the materials developed towards staging the production. The goal of the artistic response is to create a “first look” into a text that gives the team the possibility of discovering all of the imaginative, unpredictable and personal material that occurs when one has free rein. More concrete, we ask questions to the text or theme and through small artistic practices as improvisation, poems, videos, drawings etc., we propose answers.

Based on experiences in a voice and text workshop with female acting students, Dorte will invite us to look into working methods and didactic thoughts through our own investment. Some of the important topics in the workshops will be empowerment and personal engagement, division of responsibilities, how to create a safe space and how to deliver technique in a non-hierarchical way. We will all bring important texts into the room to read and to share.

CV FOR WORKSHOP HOLDERS

Charlotte Østergaard

Charlotte Østergaard is a Danish visual artist in between costume, object and textile who, over the last 20 years, has worked with the body as a cultural and artistic expression. Charlotte has designed costumes for more than 50 contemporary dance performances, for numerous dance companies and independent choreographers in Denmark and abroad, several of which has received theatre awards.

Charlotte has received several grants from the Danish Art Foundation and has exhibited at juried national and international exhibitions. She has exhibited and presented papers on several of her independent artistic research projects at international conferences. In 2015 she was employed at the Danish National School of Performing Arts (DDSKS). At DDSKS Charlotte has developed an artistic research project “Textile Techniques as a Potential for Costume design”. She recently received funding from The Danish Cultural Ministry to continue the artistic research on costume to develop a method to bring physicality into design process.

Inger Eilersen

Inger Eilersen is a Danish director and head of education of the Directing programme at the Danish National School of Performing Arts since 2001. Within the teaching area Inger has especially focused on research methods, text analysis, facilitation of artistic processes, response and feedback techniques and artistic response – a course she has developed over the last several years.

Inger has also been head of Artistic Research at The Danish National School of Performing Arts, and since 2015 she has done her own artistic research project called Human Migration. The project's ambition is to find ways and staging strategies to put the Performing Arts in dialogue with other fields of knowledge, through a collective research- and development, focusing on the dialogue between scientist, artists and migrants.

Dorte Koch

Dorte Koch graduated as a voice teacher from Central School of Speech and Drama, London, U.K. in 1993 and holds an MA in Adult Education and Human Resource from Roskilde University, Denmark.

Dorte Koch has taught voice, speech and expression and at the Danish National School of Performing Arts for more than 20 years and has more than 20 years' experience in voice training and verbal communication skills training in the private sector. She has extensive experience as a communication skills facilitator and voice teacher and has taught and trained a large number of customers with very different backgrounds and needs. In 2010 Dorte Koch published the book “Find din stemme” in Danish.
